

GOSPEL REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSS

(Taken from 'Pastoral Liturgy')

The leprosy of Naaman and the ten men in the gospel serves as a metaphor for sinfulness, the condition that makes us unfit for the presence of God and despicable in the eyes of others. Separated from God and alienated from society, we are truly in a deplorable state, a state out of which we are unable to extricate ourselves. Into these seemingly hopeless conditions step the prophet Elisha and Jesus. Each in his own way brings the healing power of God, the saving grace of God. Paul is such a mediator as well. He brings the gospel to those who are in need of salvation. When people are open to his preaching, they are transformed and made ready to receive eternal glory.

After healing come gratitude and praise. Both Naaman and the lone Samaritan are so filled with gratitude that they return to the one responsible for their healing. They are not so preoccupied with their good fortune as to forget that it came to them as a gift. Their response is the kind of thanks and praise that is proclaimed in the psalm and that is also celebrated at each Sunday Eucharist. We have been saved from our alienation from God and from each other so let us give thanks to the Lord.

Those who know that they have been healed, who realize that this was a gift freely given to them, and who return to give thanks have, by these acts of devotion, stepped over a threshold into a new way of living. Their thanks and praise usher them into a new age, the age of eschatological promise.

Feast Days this week.....

Tues 15 Oct—**St Teresa of Jesus**—Born in Avila (Spain) in 1515. Left her aristocratic family for the Carmelite monastery in Avila at the age of 20, but only after two decades of dryness in prayer felt an inner conversion to Christ. Remembered as a strong, practical reformer who restored the strict Carmelite observance of poverty, solitude and austerity. She died in 1582.

Thurs 17 Oct—**St Ignatius of Antioch**— Born probably in Syria. He is remembered for seven letters written on his way to execution. They show him to be devoted to Christ and his resurrection; they urge Christians to unity in and through the Eucharist and around their local bishop. He called himself the 'God-bearer'. Died a martyr in Rome about 107.

Fri 18 Oct—**St Luke**—By early Christian tradition, Luke is named as author of the Third Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles. He was almost certainly a Gentile and perhaps a companion of St Paul, he wrote to reassure those who had grown uncertain towards the end of the first century. In his gospel, the compassion of Christ is inclusive of all: Gentile and Jew, the poor and the rich, women and men, the outcast and the privileged.

This made Jesus say, 'Were not all ten made clean? The other nine, where are they? It seems that no one has come back to give praise to God, except this foreigner.' And he said to the man, 'Stand up and go on your way. Your faith has saved you.'
